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Former Trade Minister Call For Improved Infrastructure to Facilitate Trade

To facilitate regional integration, Zambia's former Minister of Commerce, Trade and Industry Robert Sichinga has called on member states to improve infrastructure and transportation at border posts.

Mr. Sichinga said there is a wide range of soft infrastructure constraints obstructing the regional integration process, including the lack of harmonisation of policies, regulations, and procedures governing both trade and infrastructure development.

In addition, poor hard infrastructure continues to cast a long shadow on Africa's competitiveness and diversification agenda.

"SADC has been promoting intra-regional transport development, with particular emphasis on the development of corridors. There is need to address the challenges being faced at border posts, currency harmonisation, and institutional frameworks to facilitate regional integration," he said.

He said this in Lusaka during the regional CSO capacity building workshop held in Lusaka organised by CUTS and SDGCA, which attracted participants from Malawi, Tanzania, Zambia and Zimbabwe.

SADC is a Regional Economic Community comprising 16 Member States; Angola, Botswana, Comoros, Democratic Republic of Congo, Eswatini, Lesotho, Madagascar, Malawi, Mauritius, Mozambique, Namibia, Seychelles, South Africa, United Republic Tanzania, Zambia and Zimbabwe.

Govts Urged to Develop SNCs Engagement Calendar

Governments have been advised to develop an annual calender for the operations of the SADC National Committees (SNCs) to allow for predictable engagement processes and ensure social accountability.

SDGCA senior economist Dr. EnockTwinoburyo said the creation of an annual calendar will aide Non State Actors (NSAs) to be actively involved at national and regional levels in government and NSA-led processes on the implementation and monitoring of the RISDP to formalise the social compact between states and people.

"SADC secretariat and member states should

also establish platforms and processes, including publicly sharing plans and reports, at regional and national levels to ensure NSAs are able to engage substantively in the implementation and monitoring of the RISDP, built upon the principles of social accountability," DrTwinoburyo said.

He said this in Lusaka during the regional CSO capacity building workshop held in Lusaka organized by CUTS and SDGCA, which attracted participants from Malawi, Tanzania, Zambia and Zimbabwe.

He also called for the establishment of NSA national advocacy forum comprised of the key apex bodies that work collaboratively with NSA technical committees on the respective

thematic areas. The NSA advocacy forum would therein interface with SADC SNCs as well as SADC Civil Society Forum and the envisaged NSA Forum.

Dr Twinoburyo further urged the SADC secretariat to popularise the NSA engagement mechanism guidelines (once approved) to all stakeholders.

"There is need to promote proactive information disclosure through the use of multiple communication channels including the NSA established forum and SADC NSA office... Governments should tap into the diverse reserves of skills and knowledge within NSAs to provide training for members of SNCs," he said.



Bring SADC Closer to The People

CUTS in partnership with the SDGCA held four hybrid regional meetings that commenced with the media training, public debate forum, CSO led advocacy and CSO capacity building workshop that attracted participants from Malawi, Tanzania, Zambia and Zimbabwe.

will remain invisible and the organisation will not fully realise its development aim, which is to eradicate poverty in the SADC region with its citizens being prime drivers of the integration agenda," MsMulenga said.

SDGCA programme director Dr. Ambrose Aheisibwe Rwaheru highlighted how the media can effectively leverage SADC processes, in supporting monitoring and advocacy. Closing the workshop CUTS board member Mr. Sanjeev Nair, acknowledged the achievements made in bringing SADC closer to the people.
